STORY: Department of Ecology adopts new regulations

The Washington State Department of Ecology issued a new set of regulations to *severely* limit the amount of toxic chemicals in consumer products.

As consumer products are used and thrown away, they often release chemicals into homes and environments across the state. These chemicals are linked to *health* problems such as cancer, or developmental delays in children. Two of the most notable are PFAS— used to create water resistant material— and phenolic compounds, used in laundry detergents as well as food and drink can linings.

Washington state passed the *Toxic Pollutant Law* in 2019 which allows the Department of Ecology to regulate chemicals by *class* so they can prevent one toxic chemical from being swapped for another *equally dangerous* one. The Department of Ecology's director Laura Watson said in a statement quote "this is a milestone for pollution in Washington State. We've taken the first step toward closing gaps in the existing federal regulations," unquote.

STORY: TRAIN DEATH AN ACCIDENT

Bellingham police department says the tragic death of 15-year-old Lucy Guerra (GWARE-uh) was accidental. Guerra was a freshman at Bellingham High School and was struck by a train while walking along the trestle above Squalicum Beach.

First responders attempted, but were unable, to revive the girl. Later the Whatcom County Medical Examiner confirmed the death was an accident. In an email to Bellingham High School students, family and staff, principal Marty Atkins expressed deep sorrow over the event.

Saying, quote Lucy made a positive impact on our school and in our community in a number of ways. She will be missed," unquote.

A gofundme set up to help the Guerra family has already raised over 26 thousand dollars.

STORY: Man pleads guilty to 12 felonies in Whatcom Superior Court
Brandon Maurice Thompson, age 29, pled guilty to 12 felonies and one
gross misdemeanor charge in Whatcom Superior Court last week. Charges
include 3 counts of identity theft second degree, 4 counts of possession of
a stolen vehicle, possession of a stolen firearm, and more.

Thompson was sentenced to 6 years and will receive credit for the one year served while awaiting trial.

Story: Roadworks Scammers Impersonating Whatcom County Employees

Whatcom County Public Works made an announcement yesterday to warn residents of scammers impersonating Whatcom County Employees. One resident reported being offered free gravel left over at a nearby job site.

In that case the scammers claimed they were Whatcom County employees doing chip sealing work.

The scammers offered to lay the gravel out for free, and brought in

equipment to do so. They stayed until they were asked to leave by the

homeowner, and then asked for money for their services.

According to Whatcom Public Works, these kinds of scammers are usually

unregistered contractors using high pressure sales tactics, often targeting

senior citizens, who inflate their price once the work is done.

Whatcom Public Works told KMRE their employees do not show up

unsolicited, and will *never* offer to sell goods or services.
